I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Micah Powell called the meeting to order at approximately 6:00 p.m.

II. ROLL CALL

Council Members Present: Councilmember George Reuter; Councilmember Sara Curtis; Councilmember Andrew Rodriguez; Mayor Micah Powell; Vice Mayor Dan Snyder; Councilmember Jose Garcia; Councilmember Sylvia Guanajuato Rodriguez

III. INVOCATION

Mr. Bob Skier gave tonight's invocation.

IV. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Mayor Snyder led the Council and the public in the Pledge of Allegiance.

V. PUBLIC APPEARANCES

A. Scheduled

1. Presentation of Key to the City to Harvey Krauss

Mayor Powell presented Mr. Krauss with the “Key to the City” plaque for his years of service as city manager for the community.

Mr. Krauss told the Council, city staff and the public that it has been an honor and a privilege to serve as city manager for eight years for the city.

B. Unscheduled

1. Ursula Chavez – 522 W. Frontier Street, Eloy

Ms. Chavez conveyed that she represents Chavez Creations who every year for the past five years have been doing a “family giveback” in the community for the holiday. She is overwhelmed with the number of families in the community who are not getting help and resources. Ms. Chavez said she has contacted businesses in Eloy and outside the city to try to get some help to assist the families, but have hit a roadblock. Ms. Chavez asked the Council if the city have any resources available to help.

Mayor Powell asked Ms. Chavez how many families signed up for assistance.

Ms. Chavez said 48 families in Eloy have signed up for help, and more are still coming. She currently has toys and food for about 25 families.

Mayor Powell said he and his family would like to make a cash donation to help.

Councilmember Guanajuato Rodriguez asked if there was a screening process, and if she collaborated with other agencies to ensure families are not double dipping.

Ms. Chavez said yes. Families are required to provide documentation for each family member, proof of residency, employment status, and nation of the hardship. She conveyed that the Pinal County Sheriff’s department works with Arizona City families, but not Eloy families, and CAHRA oversees the donations from the Eloy police and fire departments. Ms. Chavez told the Council she would be meeting with CAHRA staff tomorrow to compare lists to ensure families are not on both lists.

Vice Mayor Snyder asked Ms. Chavez to email the Council with more information on how they could possibly help out. He told her that Council emails can be found on the city’s website.

Councilmember Curtis asked if the city have a process for organizations seeking charitable donations for future requests.

Mayor Powell asked Mr. Cooper if the city has a process.

Mr. Cooper reminded the Council that under call to the public, comments are limited to directing staff to study the matter or reschedule for further consideration or decision at a later date. He said this is all that Council can generally do.

Mr. Cooper conveyed that the city considers issues from various nonprofits, however, the Arizona State Constitution has the “gift clause” that prohibits cities from gifting money unless for a public purpose. He said some of the things Ms. Chavez presented does have some validity in doing public services that may not be readily available in the city, but could in a larger municipality. Mr. Cooper stated that unfortunately, Council is limited because this is call to the public item and not an action item. He said Council has given direction to Ms. Chavez on how to contact them to see if there is something the city can do before the holidays. Mr. Cooper said now that the Council is aware of this, this is something that could be addressed before the holiday season arrives next year.

2. J.W. Tidwell – 105 W. LaSiesta Dr, Eloy

Item B: Mr. Tidwell expressed concerned about the police department’s request to purchase 40 rifles when there are not that many police officers in the department. He said all police officers are not on patrol at the same time. He said \$56,000 is a lot of money to spend for rifles that will sit in an armory. Mr. Tidwell said this is an expense that could be better spent elsewhere in the city.

Item I: Mr. Tidwell conveyed that public works wants to spend \$909,000 for road improvements. He said one of the streets on list for improvements is LaSiesta Drive located between Main Street and 11th Street. Mr. Tidwell said he cannot find the street at all in the city. He was concerned about the city being charged for a non-existent street. Mr. Tidwell wondered how accurate is the information Council is receiving from staff.

Items K, L & M: Mr. Tidwell wanted to know when was a subcommittee appointed by the Council to interview the applicants for board appointments. He has attended every meeting since November and is not aware of a subcommittee appointment on the agendas. Mr. Tidwell asked when were the five people that are on tonight’s agenda for appointment interviewed. He wanted to know if the Council is using a subcommittee to keep people they do not want on a board or commission as a way of keeping them off.

VI. REPORTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

A. Council Members’ Announcements

1. Vice Mayor Snyder gave a brief report on his attendance at the Pinal Partnership breakfast last Friday. Guest speaker, Mr. Elliott Pollack gave his annual

economic forecast for 2022. Vice Mayor Snyder said Councilmembers Curtis and Garcia also attended the meeting, along with Mr. Malewitz and Mr. Vlaming.

2. Councilmember Curtis conveyed that she also attended a board and commission training in Phoenix last Friday. She said there was an open discussion and support about limiting terms and creating ad-hoc committees to interview applicants, which is what Eloy is already doing.

B. Mayor's Announcements

1. Mayor Powell commended Mr. Anchondo, his staff, and the streets and police departments staff, for doing an outstanding job putting the annual Christmas in the Park and Electric Light Parade event together. He said it was the most attended event he has seen in the city. Mayor Powell said he received numerous emails complimenting the city on the event.
2. Mayor Powell gave a brief update on Covid-19 cases in Pinal County and Eloy.
3. Mayor Powell announced a vaccine clinic at city hall on December 16th from 9am to 3pm. No appointment is necessary.
4. Mayor Powell read a short statement reiterating Council's decision to not make any decisions regarding the lease or expansion of the landfill at this time. He said contract negotiations have stopped.

C. City Manager's Announcements

Mr. Malewitz provided the following communications to the Council and public:

1. November Check Register – Vice Mayor Snyder asked Mr. Malewitz if he expects the city to issue more Covid vaccination checks.

Mr. Malewitz conveyed that the deadline has passed for employees to submit their vaccination cards. He said there may be a few more trickling in for December.

2. Mr. Malewitz wanted to clarify a statement made by Mr. Tidwell earlier this evening. Mr. Malewitz confirmed the existence of LaSiesta Drive that extends over next to Main Street and south of Battaglia. He said the information was just provided to him by Mr. Brown.

There being no further requests, Mayor Powell called for a motion to approve.

Motion by Councilmember Garcia, seconded by Councilmember Reuter to remove agenda item VII-B from the Consent Agenda and approve remaining Consent Agenda items as presented, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

B. ACCEPTANCE OF A PROPOSAL FROM BRAVO COMPANY MANUFACTURING (BMC), A SOLE SOURCE VENDOR, FOR THE PURCHASE OF FORTY (40) AR-15 RIFLES FOR THE ELOY POLICE DEPARTMENT AT A COST NOT TO EXCEED \$57,000.00

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Council authorize the acceptance of a proposal from Bravo Company Manufacturing (BCM), a sole source vendor, for the purchase of forty (40) AR-15 rifles for the Eloy Police Department at a cost not to exceed \$57,000.00.*

The Eloy Police Department requests authorization to accept a proposal from Bravo Company Manufacturing (BCM) for the purchase of forty (40) AR-15 rifles. The recommendation to purchase from BCM follows an evaluation of several manufacturers by a committee comprised of officers, supervisors, and firearms training staff within the Department.

These rifles will replace the existing rifles in the Department's inventory. Additional purchase approval for sound suppressors and other equipment necessary to properly outfit each rifle for field deployment will be requested in the near future, consistent with City purchasing guidelines.

BCM is a sole source vendor, veteran owned company and a sole source letter is attached to the proposal. The purchase of patrol rifles is one of the Capital Improvement Projects approved in the 2021-2022 fiscal year budget.

FISCAL IMPACT: *The total cost to the City for the production, printing of 250 hard copies and 100 USB drives labeled with EloyAZ.gov and prior-loaded with the brochure totaled \$3,365.00. Offsetting this cost is a grant (the City applied for and was awarded) from APS for \$2,000 making the City's adjusted total cost \$1,365. This cost has been budgeted in the Community Development annual budget under Economic Development.*

Vice Mayor Snyder conveyed that the department currently has 27 rifles, and wants to purchase 40 more. He wanted to know what would happen to the 27 rifles currently in the department. Vice Mayor Snyder also asked why purchase is the department purchasing 40 rifles when they seem to be getting by with 27.

Lieutenant Gwaltney explained that the department has 32 sworn officers, in addition to two reserve officers. The existing rifles are aged and not equipped to be consistent with what the modern industrial standard is for a law enforcement patrol rifle program. He said the existing rifles do not have lights or backup sighting equipment. Lieutenant Gwaltney said the rifles are relatively low quality and are about 15 years old in service life. He said the Council approved \$100,000 in capital improvement to upgrade the existing patrol rifles. Lieutenant Gwaltney said not every sworn police officer have an issued rifle because there are not enough to go around. The department recognizes that the purchase is significant, but part of the department's plan is to plan into the future. He conveyed that as the city continues to grow and with the possibility of a police department expansion over the years, the idea of purchasing quality upgraded rifles at this point allows the department to grow with city development into the future. Lieutenant Gwaltney said the existing 27 rifles

would be used as trade-in value not for the purchase of the rifles, but for ancillary equipment necessary to complete upgrade of the new rifles. With 32 sworn officer positions, plus reserve officers, Lieutenant Gwaltney said the department would be left with 6 additional rifles that would not be issued. He asked the Council to take into consideration that whenever there is an officer involved shooting, the weapon used by the officer is taken as evidence by the investigating agency and not returned to the individual for months at a time. He said this also goes for weapons that may be lost, stolen, damaged, or no longer viable.

Vice Mayor Snyder asked how many officers would the department have at a scene with a rifle at one time.

Lieutenant Gwaltney explained that weapons are issued to individual officers so they can be properly zeroed and maintained by that officer. He said it is not practical to have a rack of weapons that an officer would simply take one to go on patrol. Lieutenant Gwaltney said it is important that the weapon is properly zeroed and accurate to the officer that is using it, to make sure that the officer is hitting the intended target if lethal force from a rifle platform is necessary. He said it is also not consistent with industry standards.

There being no further questions, Mayor Powell called for a motion.

Motion by Vice Mayor Snyder, seconded by Councilmember Guanajuato Rodriguez to accept a proposal from Bravo Company Manufacturing (BCM), a sole source vendor, for the purchase of forty (40) AR-15 rifles for the Eloy Police Department at a cost not to exceed \$57,000.00, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

VIII. BUSINESS

A. STAFF TO PRESENT THE UPDATED 2022 ELOY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT BROCHURE FOR USE IN CITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT MARKETING EFFORTS

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Information only.*

Over the last several months, Community Development staff, working in conjunction with ROXCO completed an updated printed and electronic version of the Eloy Economic Development brochure titled, "Eloy, Arizona - The Intersection of Value, Location and Opportunity." This document, in both forms, will be used for public presentations, inquiries by site selectors, brokers, land owners, end users, trade shows, direct mail and other users as appropriate. This new brochure was recently used by the Mayor and contingent that attended the International Council of Shopping Centers Trade Show earlier this month.

FISCAL IMPACT: *The total cost to the City for the production, printing of 250 hard copies and 100 USB drives labeled with EloyAZ.gov and prior-loaded with the brochure totaled \$3,365.00. Offsetting this cost is a grant (the City applied for and was awarded) from APS for \$2,000 making the City's adjusted total cost \$1,365. This cost has been budgeted in the Community Development annual budget under Economic Development.*

Mr. Fairman presented an updated version of the city's economic development brochure for 2022 via PowerPoint presentation. He gave the Council a copy of the new brochure as well as a thumb drive of the brochure.

Mayor Powell conveyed that the idea of using a thumb drive when he and some of the Council attending the ICSC conference two years ago was beneficial. He said he and several Councilmembers just returned from attending this year's ICSC conference in Las Vegas. Mayor Powell said the event was not well attended, which was a plus for the city because they were able to go directly to the businesses to promote the city with the brochures and thumb drives.

Mayor Powell commended Mr. Fairman, Mr. Vlaming and everyone involved for doing an amazing job with the brochure and thumb drive.

B. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION NO.: 21-1523 AUTHORIZING THE NOTICE OF INTENT TO INCREASE RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE WATER SYSTEM.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Staff recommends adoption of Resolution No. 21-1523 authorizing the notice of intent to increase rates and charges for the water system.*

The Water and Wastewater rate study began in November 2019 when the City Council approved a contract with Willdan Financial Services (Willdan) to perform a utility rate study for Water and Wastewater services. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the study was put on hold. In January 2021, Willdan re-started the study and began compiling data for the report. On September 20, 2021, Willdan made a presentation to the City Council on two rate scenarios for Water and Wastewater.

Since 2000, the City Council has approved only two (2) rate plan increases for Water and Wastewater. In 2007, the Council approved a three-year rate plan with an average rate increase for Water being 5% and Wastewater being 2.5% per year. The next rate plan the City Council approved was in 2013, with the implementation happening over three years. The average rate of increase for Water was 16%, and Wastewater was 9% over the three years.

With the completion of the utility rate study, the next step is for the Council to adopt a notice of intent and set a public hearing date on the proposed increases. Per Arizona Revised Statutes 9-511.01, this notice of intention is required when increasing Water

or Wastewater rates. By adopting a notice of intention, the Council is not increasing utility rates but acknowledging that rates are being reviewed and considered.

A notice of intention must be adopted at least 60 days before a public hearing can be held. If approved, the public hearing will be scheduled to take place on Monday, February 28, 2022 at 6:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. During this meeting, Willdan Financial Services will present the rate study and provide a formal motion to the Council seeking authorization to increase the rates and charges for both the Water and Wastewater system. After the public hearing period has been completed, Council has the option to take action and adopt new rates and charges.

The new rates and charges to be presented on February 28th are critical to the maintenance and operation of the City's existing water and wastewater systems and for funding future capital development projects of those facilities.

Keith Brown, Public Works Director, concurs with the information presented.

FISCAL IMPACT: None

Mr. Wright gave a brief overview of the proposed resolution that would authorize the city to adopt a notice of intent to increase rates and charges for the water system, and set a date for a public hearing. He pointed out that the notice of intent has to be published 60 days prior to the public hearing, per Arizona Revised Statutes. Mr. Wright assured the Council and the public that adoption the resolution will not increase water rates. It just means the Council is considering and reviewing rate charges. He said the public hearing is scheduled for February 28, 2022. Willdan representatives, who conducted the utility rate study for the city will be at the meeting to present the results of the study. Mr. Wright said members of the public will have the opportunity at that time to comment on the proposed rate increase. He said if it is the wish of the Council to move forward with the rate study, the next step would be for the Council to adopt the rate plan at the first Council meeting in March. Mr. Wright reiterated that tonight's adoption of the resolution authorizes the city to publish a notice of intent and schedule a public hearing. Copies of the rate study would be available at the public library as well as the city clerk's office for public review.

Mr. Wright conveyed that this information would be the same for item C on tonight's agenda.

There being no questions or comments from the Council, Mayor Powell called for a motion to read the resolution by title only.

Motion by Councilmember Garcia, seconded by Vice Mayor Snyder to read Resolution No. 21-1523 by title only, passed unanimously (7-0).

The city clerk read the resolution title into the record.

Mayor Powell called for a motion to adopt the resolution.

Motion by Vice Mayor Snyder, seconded by Councilmember Garcia to adopt Resolution No. 21-1523, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

C. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION NO.: 21-1524 AUTHORIZING THE NOTICE OF INTENT TO INCREASE RATES AND CHARGES FOR THE WASTEWATER SYSTEM.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Staff recommends adoption of Resolution No.: 21-1524 authorizing the notice of intent to increase rates and charges for the wastewater system.*

The Water and Wastewater rate study began in November 2019 when the City Council approved a contract with Willdan Financial Services (Willdan) to perform a utility rate study for Water and Wastewater services. Mr. Wright conveyed that the information he provided in agenda item B is the same for this item with the exception of the notice of intent is for increasing rates and charges for the city's wastewater system. He said the public hearing would also be held on February 28, 2022. Again, he stated that adoption of the proposed resolution would not increase wastewater rates or charges, but only authorize the city to publish the notice of intent and set a public hearing date.

Councilmember Curtis asked if this applies to customers who are hooked into the city's sewer system.

Mr. Wright said this is correct.

Mayor Powell called for a motion to read the resolution by title only.

Motion by Vice Mayor Snyder, seconded by Councilmember Curtis to read Resolution No. 21-1524 by title only, passed unanimously (7-0).

The city clerk read the resolution title into the record.

Mayor Powell call for a motion to adopt.

Motion by Councilmember Reuter, seconded by Councilmember Rodriguez to adopt Resolution No. 21-1524, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

D. NOMINATE AND SELECT A CITY COUNCIL MEMBER TO SERVE AS THE EX OFFICIO MEMBER ON THE ELOY REVITALIZATION COMMISSION

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *The staff is requesting 1) that the City Council re-establish the position of Ex Officio member to the Revitalization Commission, and 2) nominate and approve a City Council member to serve in that position.*

In 2021, the Eloy Downtown Advisory Commission was reimagined and established as the Eloy Revitalization Commission with the first meeting to occur in January of 2022. In addition to the Council approving citizen members to serve on that Commission, there is also a need for coordination with the City Council on an ongoing basis through the establishment of the Ex Officio position and subsequently

nominating and choosing a City Council member to serve in that capacity. This role includes attending Revitalization Commission meetings, representing the views of the Eloy City Council, providing input on Commission initiatives and updating the City Council on Revitalization Commission projects, activities and other initiatives.

FISCAL IMPACT: None

Mr. Vlaming conveyed that earlier this year, the Council revamped and eliminated some of the city boards and commissions. One of the boards that was revamped was the Eloy Downtown Advisory Commission and the Historic Preservation Commission. The commission was reimagined and established as the Eloy Revitalization Commission, and is scheduled to hold its first meeting in January. Mr. Vlaming said the commission is in need of a Councilmember to serve as ex-officio to the commission who would be appointed by the Council.

Vice Mayor Snyder wanted to know how many members are there on the commission.

Mr. Vlaming said the commission is a seven member board. There are currently five individuals who were appointed by the Council to serve on the commission with two vacancies.

Mayor Powell pointed out that applicants are not required to be residents to serve on the commission.

Mr. Vlaming said this is correct. The city is looking for specific attributes in terms of technical expertise or people who serve the community who do not live here.

Councilmember Curtis inquired about the purpose of the commission.

Mr. Vlaming explained that the Eloy Downtown Advisory Commission focused specifically on downtown Eloy. The Eloy Revitalization Commission would not only focus on downtown, but other areas of the city that the commission could consider for revitalization.

Mayor Powell opened the floor for nominations for ex-officio.

Vice Mayor Snyder requested to serve as ex-officio. He said he was part of a group that put together the five-year economic program. He was also involved with the city's original marketing brochure. Vice Mayor Snyder said he has attended most of the Eloy Downtown Advisory Commission meetings and would like to continue in that role.

Councilmembers Reuter and Curtis supported Vice Mayor Snyder's appointment as ex-officio.

There being no further nominations, Mayor Powell closed the floor and called for a motion to appoint Vice Mayor Snyder as ex-officio.

Motion by Councilmember Curtis, seconded by Councilmember Guanajuato Rodriguez to appoint Vice Mayor Snyder as ex-officio to the Eloy Revitalization Commission, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

At this time, Mayor Powell gave members of the Council and staff the opportunity to reflect on the year 2021, which is coming to a close in a few weeks.

IX. EXECUTIVE SESSION

No executive session requested by the Council or city staff.

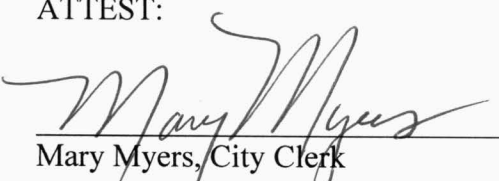
X. ADJOURNMENT
