I. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Micah Powell called the meeting to order at approximately 6:00 p.m.

II. ROLL CALL

III. INVOCATION

Ms. Christina Bauta gave tonight's invocation.

IV. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Councilmember Reuter led the Council and the public in the Pledge of Allegiance.

V. PUBLIC APPEARANCES

B. Unscheduled

Ceil Levatino – 4316 W. Winslow Way, Eloy

Mrs. Levatino voiced her support for the appointment of Andrew Sutton to replace Councilmember Reuter, who will step down June 30th. She stressed the importance of the Council appointing a person who may be out of their comfort zone and who brings a unique and different skill set. Mrs. Levatino said Mr. Sutton would be a wonderful addition to the Council.

Mrs. Levatino also commented on agenda item VIII-A. She suggested Council consider using goats to remove the vegetation in the city rather than hiring a contractor to do the work. She said it would be less expensive and the citizens would probably enjoy watching the goats eat.

VI. REPORTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

A. Council Member Announcements

Councilmember Reuter conveyed that it has been an honor and a pleasure to serve as a member of the Council. He praised the experience of the city staff and thanked them for their professionalism. Councilmember Reuter said he believes he is leaving the city in way better shape than when he found it, and hope for a better future. He applauded the three candidates who interviewed for his seat, and encouraged the public to become more involved in city government.

B. Mayor Announcements

Mayor Powell made the following announcements:

- Gave a brief update to the public on a story that ran on Channel 12 news related to fraudulent activity at the Skyriders Inn at the Eloy airport. He said the city has been aware of this however, could not speak about it because of legal issues. Mayor Powell stated the matter has been taken care of to the best of the city's ability. He gave a phone interview today to a reporter from the Washington Post about the story. Mayor Powell assured the public that the Council and staff would make every effort to make sure the city is protected from something like this ever happening again.

C. City Manager Announcements

Mr. Malewitz made the following announcements:

- City offices would be closed July 4th in observance of the 4th of July holiday. Mr. Malewitz invited the public to attend the city's annual 4th of July bash where there would be lots of fun family activities and fireworks.
- Work continues on the Frontier Street Community Tree project. The contractor is currently trenching and installing the irrigation lines.
- A blood drive will be held at city hall on Wednesday, June 28th from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

- A special meeting is scheduled Thursday, June 29th at 5:00 p.m. for final approval of the FY23-24 budget.
- A contract was secured in the amount of \$7,000 for the pedestrian hybrid project. The money will be used for design and appropriation of bids for preparation of advertising the project out for bids.
- City staff will have an informal meeting with solar participants this Wednesday, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., to discuss some of the details of the proposed ordinance provisions. Mr. Malewitz said the document would be presented to the P&Z Commission in July for recommendation, before coming to the Council for action.
- Mr. Jeff Fairman, the city's economic development specialist, will be attending the Arizona Workforce Summit, June 29-30.

Mayor Powell asked Council if there were any corrections, comments or item(s) to remove from the Consent Agenda.

With there being none, Mayor Powell called for a motion.

Motion by Vice Mayor G. Rodriguez, seconded by Councilmember Garcia to approve the Consent Agenda items as presented, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

VIII. BUSINESS

- A. DISCUSSION AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL TO AWARD CONTRACTS FOR ON-CALL VEGETATION REMOVAL AND VACANT RESIDENTIAL LOT CLEAN-UP SERVICES FOR THE PUBLIC WORKS AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENTS IN RESPONSE TO THE CITY OF ELOY ADVERTISEMENT FOR STATEMENTS OF QUALIFICATIONS; AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE NECESSARY CONTRACT DOCUMENTS.**

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Staff recommends that Council accept submittals from Southwest Siteworks, LLC., and Epifini Landscaping, Inc. for on-call vegetation removal and residential lot clean-up services, and authorize the Mayor to sign the necessary contract documents.*

Historically, the Public Works and Community Development Departments have requested the use of contractor services for vegetation removal, right-of-way maintenance, and lot clean-ups when City staff have been unable to perform these services because of other priorities or lack of workforce. In May, the Public Works Department advertised a Request for Statements of Qualifications for qualified contractors to submit for consideration to be awarded a contract for right-of-way maintenance and/or lot cleanups. The Solicitation closed on June 16th with only two firms submitting a response; Southwest Siteworks, LLC., and Epifini Landscaping, Inc. An evaluation committee was formed to review the two successful submittals and after thorough review and consideration, recommended both firms for contract award consideration. Since only two successful companies submitted bids, having both of them under an on-call contract will provide better service deliverability when an instance arises that one or the other is unable to provide services due to other obligations. The services covered under the contract will be utilized on an as-needed basis. The scope of work and compensation will be determined at the time of needed services and fees negotiated on a case-by-case basis according to the scope of the work.

FISCAL IMPACT: *Fiscal impact will be determined during the scope of work on a case-by-case basis and deducted from the appropriate operating expense line item for either, or both, the Public Works and/or Community Development Department's annual operating budget.*

Mr. Rencher conveyed that due to the heavy rains the city has experienced over the past months, there is an abundance vegetation around the city, that city crews have not been able to maintain. He said the city solicited Requests for Qualifications from contractors to assist with weed abatement and establish an on call contract list. Mr. Rencher stated the city received two submittals; Epifini Landscaping and Southwest Siteworks, LLC. He recommended the Council to enter into contracts with both companies for on-call services. Mr. Rencher stated that a price would be established based on the scope of work and on an on-call basis.

Mayor Powell had the following concerns:

- The length of time it would take to obtain a cost from the contractor and bring back to the Council for approval.
- Certain areas of the city excluded for weed abatement (MLK Street, Alsdorf Road, north Toltec, Estrella Road)
- Would like the proposed contract to be an open-ended contract for the city overall, not just for specific areas.

Mr. Rencher conveyed that if approved tonight, he can reach out to the contractors immediately to get a price. Based on the city's purchasing policy, if the cost is below \$20,000, Council approval would not be required. Mr. Rencher said staff can authorize the work immediately.

Mr. Rencher explained that the specified areas listed is for the contractors because of the larger equipment they have to maintain the large open spaces. He said this would free up his staff to focus on other areas in the city where city equipment can be better utilized, such as MLK Street, Alsdorf Road and north Toltec.

Mr. Rencher conveyed that he considered having the contract open-ended, however, the contract as it stands right now is for a period of two years, with the ability to renegotiate after two years.

Mayor Powell agreed that the work needs to be done, however, was not happy with the mapping of the areas.

Mr. Rencher said the Council could amend the proposed contract to remove the specific areas and make the contract open-ended within the city limits.

Mayor Powell asked Mr. Cooper for legal opinion.

Mr. Cooper conveyed that Council could approve the contract without the map, however, there could be an issue with the two companies who bid on the services – whether or not those other areas would have been beyond what they would have bid, which he believes is highly unlikely.

Mayor Powell stated that if this is not acceptable to the bidders, the city can go back out to bid again.

Mr. Rencher agreed.

Mayor Powell inquired about prison labor.

Mr. Rencher said he is currently talking to the warden at CoreCivic as well as with the state department of corrections about the inmate labor program.

With there being no further questions, Mayor Powell called for a motion.

Motion by Councilmember Garcia, seconded by Councilmember Tarango to award contracts for on-call vegetation removal and vacant residential lot clean-up services for the Public Works and Community Development departments, to Epifini Landscaping and Southwest Siteworks, LLC as presented, passed 5-2 by the following roll call votes:

B. DISCUSSION AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL TO ENTER INTO AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT (IGA) WITH THE STATE OF ARIZONA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION AUTHORIZING \$5,000,000 FROM THE STATE GENERAL FUND FOR HIGHWAY PROJECTS FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO SUNLAND GIN ROAD BETWEEN INTERSTATE 10 AND ARICA ROAD; AND AUTHORIZE THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE NECESSARY DOCUMENTS.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Staff recommends that Council approve the Intergovernmental Agreement.*

Sunland Gin Road between Interstate 10 and Arica Road has been a bottleneck for the residents of the City and the unincorporated area of Arizona City for many years. In 2014, before this area was annexed by the City of Eloy, Pinal County commissioned an Intersection Analysis of the intersection of Sunland Gin Road and Arica Road. That analysis showed that some, but not all, of the criteria for intersection controls (multidirectional stop signs or traffic signalization) were met. The study also showed that widening the roadway would alleviate some of the congestion present in 2014. Additional recommendations from the study recognized the importance of realigning Arica Road to connect to Sunland Gin approximately 1/4 mile further south than the current intersection. In 2014, the traffic counts reported in the study are as follows:

- 7,995 average annual daily traffic (AADT) southbound on Sunland Gin Road, with peak hour traffic at 525 vehicles per hour.*
- 5,255 AADT northbound on Sunland Gin Road, with peak-hour traffic at 589 vehicles per hour.*
- 3,585 AADT eastbound on Arica Road. The vast majority of this traffic is from Love's truck stop at the northwest corner of Arica Road and Sunland Gin Road.*

In 2020, the City of Eloy commissioned a Design Concept Report (DCR) on Sunland Gin Road between Interstate 10 Interchange to Mountain View Avenue, approximately 1/4 mile south of Arica Road. This study was to account for the increase in residential housing units in the Mountain View Estates subdivision 1/2 mile west of Sunland Gin Road and the increase in population in the unincorporated area of Arizona City. This DCR was used as the basis for City Staff to apply for various grants and State and Federal Funding.

Staff efforts, along with support from our local State Representatives, were critical in the City's ability to secure funding from Senate Bill 1722 which appropriated funding from the State general fund for highway projects. The State Department of Transportation will issue a warrant in the amount of \$5,000,000.00 appropriated to

the City of Eloy for Sunland Gin Rd Interstate 10 overpass and road improvements between Interstate 10 and Arica Road.

The award of \$5 million dollars is much needed as improvements to Sunland Gin Road continue to be a regional priority for the City of Eloy and Pinal County. Recent accomplishments have included Pinal County widening Sunland Gin Road north of Battaglia Road to alleviate congestion experienced by the residents of Arizona City, as well as Casa Grande completing an intersection widening at Sunland Gin Road and Hanna Road and a new intersection light at Jimmy Kerr Blvd. The City is also working with the Sun Corridor Metropolitan Planning Organization (SCMPO) to pursue additional funding opportunities and has submitted a request to the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) Planning to Programming (P2P) to have the Sunland Gin interchange analysis completed and proposed expansion added to the ADOT 5-Year Transportation Plan. Additional projects being evaluated on the City of Eloy side include widening Sunland Gin Rd. that will encompass expenses related to right-of-way purchase, drainage and environmental analysis, bringing design specifications up to current standards for bidding, and finally construction. Fortunately, the specifications for spending the grant money are pretty flexible, including the ability to use funds as local matching money for federal grant opportunities.

FISCAL IMPACT: *No fiscal impact at this time. The fiscal impact is dependent on identified activities being completed as part of the widening of Sunland Gin Rd.*

Mr. Rencher gave a brief technical overview of the proposed IGA with ADOT for road improvements at Sunland Gin Road, between I-10 and Arica Road. He said the improvements are very much needed to handle the level of traffic in the area, even though it would not completely resolve the issue. Mr. Rencher pointed out that city funds expended for this project is reimbursable from ADOT up to \$5,000,000. He said staff is working with SCMPO and ADOT to identify and secure additional funding resources.

Councilmember Snyder asked Mr. Rencher what impact would the IGA have in regards to Council approval in 2022 for staff to pursue an alternative with the traffic flow. He wanted to know would this IGA supplement and pay for this and what impact would this have on the approval.

Mr. Rencher said this would move the approval one step further. He said the \$5,000,000 that is before the Council tonight for approval is flexible and can be used for right-of-way acquisition, completing the design to prepare bid documents for advertisement, and also serve as a local match to a federal grant program.

Councilmember Snyder recalled Love's truck stop committing to help support a traffic light on Sunland Gin Road when the Council approved an expansion of the truck stop.

Mayor Powell said he recalled each business on the corner assuming some financial responsibility for the traffic light.

Mr. Rencher said he would look into this.

With there being no further questions or comments, Mayor Powell called for direction from the Council.

Motion Councilmember Snyder, seconded by Councilmember Reuter to approve an Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with ADOT, authorizing \$5,000,000 from the state general fund for highway projects for improvements to Sunland Gin Road between Interstate 10 and Arica Road; and authorize the Mayor to sign the necessary documents, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

C. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPOINTMENT OF AN INDIVIDUAL TO SERVE ON THE CITY COUNCIL TO FILL THE VACANCY OF COUNCILMEMBER GEORGE REUTER'S SEAT, EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2023.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *The City Council appoint an individual to fill a vacancy on the City Council, effective July 1, 2023, due to Councilmember George Reuter's resignation effective June 30, 2023.*

At the May 8, 2023 City Council meeting, the Council officially accepted Councilmember George Reuter's resignation as Councilmember, effective June 30, 2023. At that meeting, the Council directed the City Clerk to advertise the seat vacancy with a deadline date of June 9, 2023, for accepting letters of interest and resumes. The City Clerk received letters of interest and resumes from the following individuals; Frank Frassetto, Jr., Augustine Saucedo, and Andrew Sutton.

On June 20, 2023, the City Council held a special meeting for the purpose of interviewing the three (3) candidates for the upcoming vacant seat. It is anticipated that the Council will appoint one of the three individuals interviewed to fill the Council seat, effective July 1, 2023. The newly appointed person would serve as Councilmember until November, 2024.

Per A.R.S. §9-235.A, The Council shall fill a vacancy that may occur by appointment until the next regularly scheduled council election if the vacancy occurs more than thirty days before the nomination petition deadline.

Procedure for filling Council Vacancies from the City Code:

2-7: FILLING VACANCIES IN OFFICES:

The Council shall fill vacancies by appointment in any City office as provided by State law. (Ord. 11-803, 10-24-2011)

ARIZONA REVISED STATUTES:

9-235. Vacancies in council

A. The council shall fill a vacancy that may occur by appointment until the next regularly scheduled council election if the vacancy occurs more than thirty days before the nomination petition deadline. Otherwise, the appointment is for the unexpired term. This subsection does not apply to a charter city.

B. The member appointed shall meet the qualifications established in section 9-232.

SECRETARY OF STATE ELECTION MANUAL:

FILLING A COUNCIL VACANCY

If a vacancy occurs on your city or town council and the incumbent has more than 2 years remaining on his or her term, you are required to put the remainder of the term on your next council election ballot. This only applies if you have 4-year terms and does not affect charter cities. The law provides that if a vacancy occurs more than 30 days before nomination petitions are due for your regular election, then the vacancy is filled by election for the remainder of the unexpired term. A separate nomination petition must be prepared for a 2-year term in addition to the regular petitions for the 4-year terms. To distinguish the petitions, the clerk should print a 2-year term on the top of the petition for those wishing to fill the vacancy. On the ballot, there must be a separate section for the 2-year term listing those candidates who filed 2-year term nomination petitions. Consult with your attorney to determine when a candidate who is elected to fill a vacant position is seated.

Once a resignation occurs, the seat is filled by a person who has to run at the next general election (2 years later) to serve the balance of the four-year term of office.

FISCAL IMPACT: *There is not fiscal impact.*

Mayor Powell asked Mr. Cooper what methods could the Council consider in selecting a candidate.

Mr. Cooper explained the options and procedures available for appointing a person to the Council.

Councilmember Reuter suggested each Councilmember announce their top two candidates. The two individuals with the highest numbers would then be discussed and voted on by the Council.

It was the consensus of the Council to following the process suggested by Councilmember Reuter.

Mayor Powell wanted it known that the three individuals interviewed for the seat are amazing people, and tonight's decision would be a difficult one for the Council.

Councilmember Reuter stated whomever is appointed to take his seat, he hope the other two will stay involved in politics and run for a seat next year because he believes they would be great assets to the city.

At this time, Mayor Powell had each member of the Council announce their top two candidates.

Based on Council selections, Andrew (Andy) Sutton received 7; Frank Frassetto 4, and Augustine Saucedo 3.

Mayor Powell asked for Council direction for a motion.

A motion was made by Councilmember Garcia, and seconded by Councilmember Snyder to appoint Mr. Andrew Sutton to serve on the City Council to fill the vacancy of Councilmember George Reuter, effective July 1, 2023, passed unanimously by roll call vote (7-0).

Mr. Cooper pointed out that the appointment would expire November, 2024. Mr. Sutton would have the option of running in the next election for the remaining two years on the seat or seek a four-year term.

Councilmember Reuter stated that Mr. Frassetto and Mr. Saucedo were great candidates and encouraged them to run in 2024.

Mr. Sutton thanked the Council for the appointment and for putting their trust in him, and look forward to working together.

IX. EXECUTIVE SESSION

No executive session requested by Council or staff.

X. PRESENTATION OF PLAQUE TO OUTGOING COUNCILMEMBER GEORGE REUTER.

Mayor Powell presented Councilmember Reuter with a plaque and parting gift from the city. He thanked Councilmember Reuter for his service and passion to help others in the community. Mayor Powell told Councilmember Reuter that he would be missed.

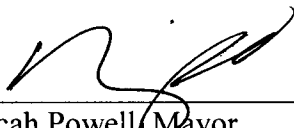
Other members of the Council and staff gave their heartfelt thanks to Councilmember Reuter for his service.

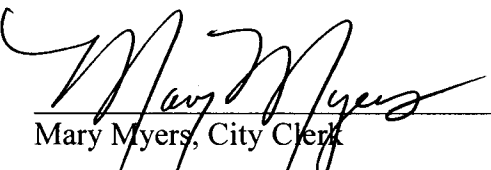

V. BUSINESS

A. PUBLIC HEARING ON PRIMARY PROPERTY TAXES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Call for a Public Hearing– Primary Property Taxes for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.*

The City of Eloy has published notices of this hearing on June 15th and June 22nd in the local paper, per state law. The primary property tax rate being recommended is \$1.0648 per \$100 assessed valuation. The proposed rate will generate \$26,422 or 2.00%, exclusive of new construction. This increase in revenue is primarily due to property valuations increasing. On a home assessed at \$100,000, the homeowner will pay \$106.48 in property taxes to the City of Eloy. This would be \$2.46 less than last year's property tax, which was \$108.94. The primary property tax levy is scheduled to be adopted on Monday, July 10, 2023, at 6:00 p.m.

FISCAL IMPACT: *The total amount generated from a primary tax rate of \$1.0648 will be \$1,372,725 annually.*

Mayor Powell declared a public hearing open for the primary property taxes.

Mr. Wright gave a brief overview of the primary property tax for FY23-24.

Mayor Powell opened for the floor for comments and questions.

With there being none, Mayor Powell closed the public hearing.

B. PUBLIC HEARING ON THE CITY OF ELOY ANNUAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Call for a public hearing on the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 City of Eloy Annual Budget.*

A public hearing is required prior to the final adoption of the Annual Budget. This is the last step before adopting the budget for Fiscal Year 2023-2024. On June 12, 2023, the City Council adopted Resolution 23-1556 adopting a tentative budget in the amount of \$58,488,315. On June 15th and June 22nd, Schedules A-G were published in the local paper in accordance with state law.

FISCAL IMPACT: *The total of all funds for the City of Eloy 2023-2024 Annual Budget is \$58,488,315.*

Mayor Powell declared a public hearing open for the FY23-24 annual budget.

Mr. Wright gave a very brief overview of the proposed budget for FY23-24 based on budget discussions with Council.

Mayor Powell opened for the floor for comments and questions.

Councilmember Reuter asked Mr. Wright if the additional \$50,000 he wanted for the police department budgeted.

Mr. Wright said yes.

With there being no further questions or comments, Mayor Powell closed the public hearing.

C. ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION NO. 23-1559 ADOPTING THE FINAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2023-2024 FOR \$58,488,315.

Staff Cover Sheet Report: *Staff recommends approval of Resolution No.23-1559 adopting Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Annual Budget for the City of Eloy for \$58,488,315.*

The City Council met on June 12, 2023 and adopted Resolution 23-1556 adopting the tentative budget for fiscal year 2023-2024 for \$58,488,315. Staff has published Schedule A-G twice in the local newspaper per statutory requirements.

A public hearing has been held regarding property tax and the final budget in accordance with state law. Upon adoption of the final budget, a date will be set for the adoption of the property tax levy. This date will be July 10, 2023, at 6:00 p.m. The final property tax rate will be determined by the Pinal Board of Supervisors and is estimated to be \$1.0648 per \$100 assessed valuation. Attached is a copy of the publicized budget. A copy of the budget will be available to the public at City Hall and the City Library.

FISCAL IMPACT: *The annual budget for fiscal year 2023-2024 is \$58,488,315.*

Mayor Powell called for a motion to read the resolution by title only.

A motion was made by Councilmember Garcia, and seconded by Councilmember Snyder to read Resolution No. 23-1559 by title only, passed unanimously.

The city clerk read the resolution title into the record.

Mayor Powell called for a motion to adopt.

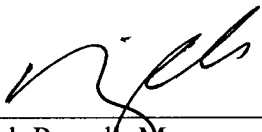

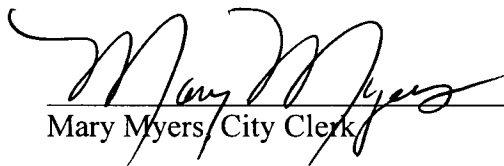
VII. ADJOURNMENT
